


INTRODUCTION





In response to the impacts of COVID-19 on Flatiron & NoMad, the OSD team assessed the district's existing physical and social conditions and proposes recommendations for expanding business operations to enhance social distancing, quality of life, and the overall neighborhood experience. Two online surveys, a focus group comprised of ground floor business stakeholders, and in-person field observations, led by Project for Public Spaces (PPS), identified business owner concerns and considered the public realm as a potential lifeline for business operations.

As such, the OSD team analyzed how streets, sidewalks, plazas, and parks were being utilized both before NYC transitioned into Phase Two of reopening on June 22nd, and thereafter through month's end. Pedestrian, subway, and bus ridership data was gathered and analyzed comparing June 2020 with pre-COVID June 2019.

Local and global precedents, in combination with the Partnership's legacy of public programming and district enhancement, were channeled into recommendations at both the individual business and district-wide scales, that may provide functional solutions for Flatiron & NoMad.




Streets west of the Park offer more mixed-use than those east of the Park. The blocks east of Madison Square Park are home to large office tenants and fewer ground floor establishments.










DAILY BUS & SUBWAY RIDERSHIP - WEEKDAY (CITYWIDE)


Sideway ridership is **down** ~83% compared to 2019




According to studies, vehicular traffic in NYC is down 35-50% compared to 2019.

NYC 'OPEN RESTAURANTS' PERMITS (as of June 29, 2020)









Many businesses may benefit from using the parking/ curbside lane in front of their establishments in other ways.






When do you plan to reopen? (GROUND FLOOR)

If you have a reopening plan, what percentage of your employees do you expect to return to in-person work? (UPPER FLOOR)







If the sidewalk, curbside lane or street in front of your business were available, would that help you reopen?




Which configuration would you invest in for a temporary outdoor operation (possibly July-October)?

Build upon Flatiron & NoMad's identity to foster an overall district experience





































